ignorantia juris non excusat:

Moral law; moral code; moral compass; laws of nature; natural law; ingrained ethics; argument from conscience; law of conscience.

Objections:

1. There are exceptions where people have followed a different moral code.
2. These moral laws are nothing more social conveniences in order to make society function properly.

Seared Conscience?

1Ti 4:1-2; Eph 4:17-19; Rom 1:28

- Will God's judgment be just?
- Does God play favoritism?

- Does God really have things under control?
